Crawford scores two in 27-6 win

South Point won the 'biggie' in rainy, sloshy South Point Stadium Friday night, soaring high on the wings of eagles to a 27-6 p a s f i n g of Shelby's Golden

It was the first Red Raider victory over Shelby since 1959, when the Big Red won a 6-0 decision in the mud. But this one was bigger (ar bigger.

It enabled Jim Biggerstaff's

Big Red Machine, ranked the number three Class 3-A team in the state, to remain undefeated and all but sewed up the regular season title.

South Point's conference mark in the Southwest 3-A is now a glittering 7-0 while Shelby is 5-I-1. Overall, the Raiders are 8-0 and Shelby 5-21.

Scott Crawford, despite the wet conditions, scored two of the Big Red touchdowns, ran his scoring total on the year to points, and has now gained 1,214 yards rushing in eight games . He entered the contest with 1,112 yards and added to his total with 104 yards in 22 carries before a good SP Stadium crowd despite the rain.

South Point now stands a good chance of finishing unbeaten for the first time since 1953, when the Big Ked went 10-0 be fore losing to Albemarle in the playoffs 14-6. Biggerstaff, incidentally, was the wingback star on that '53 team.

Beating Shelby is something we've waited on for a long time." said Biggerstaff. "And we feel mighty good about beating them since they are a good, well-coached outfit.

"I can't say enough about the overall performance of everybody on the team. Our defense stuck it to them and we moved the ball well under real bad conditions.

with shouts of "we're number one" ringing loud and clear.

The famine is over and it was powerful sweet for the undefeated, untied and undaunted South Point Red Raiders.

South Point was the state of the condense of t us. Tonight, thank goodness, the shoe was on the other foot.

The Red Raiders more than likely will play Shelby again in the post-season playoffs at Shel-by. "Actually, I think the bad field condition slowed us down," said Biggerstaff. "We've got a lot of speed we couldn't utilize tonight

The Big Red, now having scored 267 points on the season compared to the opposition's 41, has remaining league tests against East Rutherford at home next week and Burns on the road November 5. Barring a major shocker, they should finish unbeaten for the first time since '53

Except for one drive, and they were aided by two pe-nalties in a 48-yard push. Shelby was kept at bay by a stout and stubborn Red Raider defense. The Lions finished with minus rushing yardage in the second half and finished with just 38 net yards rushing for the game. South Point, aided by Craw-
