Raiders defeat Ironmen

CHERRYVILLE — South Point used a tough defense to keep Cherryville in the minus column for total yardage and the Raider offense put two touchdowns on the board as the Big Red took a 14-6 victory over the Ironmen here Friday night.

South Point scored in the first quarter and in the final stanza while Cherryville scored in the third period on a long punt return.

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The Raider defense was the key to the game as this unit constantly held the Ironmen in their own backfield and forced many mistakes on Cherryville's part.

The South Point running backs accounted for 212 yards and helped stage two long clock-eating drives in the fourth quarter.

"It was a typical first game for us," stated South Point coach Jim Biggerstaff after the win. "We made a few mistakes but the defense did a fine job. The penetration of the line on defense was great and that caused a lot of their losses.

"I know we have a long way to go," Biggerstaff continued, "but I'm very encouraged by our performance tonight."

Cherryville coach Jerry Carpenter was very displeased by the number of mistakes his feam made and said that South Point took advantage of the Ironmen's mistakes. "We made some bad moves in offense and the penalties cost us because they went in to score after we committed two of them."

South Point took the lead in the game at 1:56 in the first quarter as quarterback Mark Coley sneaked over from the one. The drive started at the Raider 47 and was highlighted by a 21-yard pass play from Coley to Wayne Froneberger and a 10 yard jolt by Fewell. Dennis Grier took care of the PAT kick.

South Point started a drive late in the second period but it was stranded at the Raider 13 after 13 plays.

The Ironmen got on the scoreboard early in the third period as Tommy Summer returned a punt from his own 22 to the Raider end zone. Summer got two good blocks that sprang to the 50 and it looked as if the big fullback would go down here. He stayed on feet through and sprinted the rest of the way, leaving the South Point defenders far beind.
